1. Narrative Songs- Novelty songs, folk songs, or lyrical rap songs which elaborate on a story.

2. Sound Songs- Field recordings, hammer-clanging-against-sickle industrial jams, pots-n'-pans-ass beats 3. Performative Songs- Songs which serve a purpose and catalyze behaviors or feelings within a specific context. I.e. A a cheer, a chant, a dirge, a curse, or white noise for treating tinnitus.

4. Songs which testify to the ambivalent tenor of existence-Melancholic, often cinematic synth riffs which speak of adventure, boredom, God, springtime, bittersweet potentiality & inevitable loss. The tones plug right into the
